## **Seniors Care in federal election 2015**

TORONTO, ON, October 9, 2015 – Yee Hong Centre for Geriatric Care has urged the 2015 federal election candidates to pay more attention to the need to prioritize seniors care as part of their national conversation.

A letter jointly signed by Dr. Joseph Y. K. "Making investments in priority areas such as housing, both independent and assisted, and a full range of well-coordinated, better-funded community and in-home services, will go a long way in reducing the demand for much more costly acute and chronic health care," they said.

They also offered to meet with the candidates to share Yee Hong's perspective on how intelligent policy-making can better address the needs of Canada's growing senior population.
